MOOCs go to K12: Higher ed trend expands to high schools

There has been much discussion about the role of MOOCs (massive open online courses) and their role and impact in higher education. Now K12 schools are looking at how MOOCs can be used to supplement and enhance current curriculum within the K12 arena. Two examples are provided: using a MOOC to get high school credit for the course but no grade is awarded and using a MOOC to present a pre-college experience. In addition, some teachers are beginning to incorporate the MOOC material into their face-to-face classrooms.

For stealing identities and passwords of fellow students in order to win a student body election at Cal State San Marcos, Matthew Weaver was sentenced to one year in prison. He pleaded guilty to “wire fraud, unauthorized access of a computer, and identity theft.” By using devices that recorded a computer user’s keystrokes, he obtained passwords for 745 users.

Technologies that are Changing and will Change the World

This is a fascinating article that reports on a presentation given by Howie DiBlasi at the ISTE (International Society for Technology in Education) conference. On the list is analytical underwear that evaluates and records electrical activity produced by the skeletal muscles. Sounds strange but researchers suggest that collection of this data could be important for medical professionals. A favorite potential product is the mind-reading shopping cart which takes a grocery list via text message, scans

the items and prices as purchases are placed in the cart, and warns the shopper if the item(s) placed in the cart violates dietary restrictions or does not appear on the grocery list. Ten other technologies are also listed.

Predicting Obesity at Birth

Researchers in Finland have developed a free, online calculator that determines a baby's likelihood of becoming obese. Factors include genetic and nongenetic (e.g. the number of people living in the household, etc.). If it can be determined which factors are the best predictors of obesity and these can be identified early on, preventative measures, e.g. parent education, nutritional guides, etc., can be designed and deployed. Maids of Hounours: Domestic study – 1-year course will hone their housekeeping skills

Yashwantrao Chavan Maharashtra Open University (YCMOU) in India has developed a one-year diploma that provides training in the following areas: taking care of children; operating modern household appliances and devices; communication skills; personality development; basic math; housekeeping; general knowledge; and current affairs. The state labor department is funding almost 85% of the cost of the program for individuals. The Mumbai Workers' Front, an organization of domestic workers, supports the idea of the program. A spokesperson said, "Education is the only tool through which they (domestic workers) can be aware of their rights and understand government schemes available for them...."

Oklahoma Public School Graduation Rates show Upward Trend over Decade

Education Week published the results of the 2010 national graduation rates recently. Based on the 2010 data, the most recent year for which data is available, the national graduation rate “reached its highest level since 1973, mostly due to gains among Hispanic and black students.” In Oklahoma, the rate rose from 73.6% in 2009 to 73.9% in 2010. This is the first year for students to be required to meet the Achieving Classroom Excellence (ACE) standards included as part of the state’s ACE legislation.

Role of Accreditation in Improving Quality in Higher Professional Management Education in India

India has passed a bill that makes accreditation from independent agencies mandatory within 3 years for higher education institutions. The legislation, entitled the National Accreditation Regulatory Authority for Higher Education Institutions, is raising concerns of whether the independent agencies can manage the anticipated onslaught of applications from management and other higher education institutions. This article explores the impact on the quality of education and on key stakeholders in the education system.

A Demographic Analysis of Graduate Programs in Higher Education Administration in the United States

A history of higher education as a field of study is presented in this article. The author focused on the demographics of these programs. Some of the findings reported are that 161 institutions offer some type of graduate degree in higher education and that there is a wide variety in the name of these programs. Another finding according to the author is that the programs are more oriented towards the “how-to’s” rather than on established theoretical perspectives.
